

Sports Premium Statement

The government has continued to provide additional funding for the academic year 2016/17 to improve the provision of physical education and sport in primary schools. This funding is direct to schools to be spent with the following aims:

- Increasing participation rates in such activities as games, dance, gymnastics, swimming and athletics.
- Increasing participation and success in competitive school sports.
- Making the physical education curriculum more inclusive.
- Expanding the growth in the range of traditional and alternative sporting activities.
- Improving partnership work on physical education with other schools and other local partners.
- Finding links with other subjects that contribute to pupils' overall achievement and their greater social, spiritual, moral and cultural skills.
- Making pupils more aware of the dangers of obesity, smoking and other such activities that undermine pupils' health.

PE Equipment	£658	At the start of the year, the PE coordinator identified any resources that needed updating, replacing or purchasing. These were bought in order to give children the appropriate resources for PE lessons, afterschool clubs and lunchtime activities.
KS1 Trim Trail	£5,000	The trim trail was installed to give the KS1 children more of a focus at playtimes, and give them equipment to apply their balance, agility and coordination skills.
KSSP Fees	£1,836	The aim of KSSP is to give children an opportunity to regularly compete against other schools. It also gives local sports groups a chance to work with the local schools and build relationships with staff, parents and children. The number of children who have competed has significantly risen this year.
Visiting Coaches	£2,297	A number of local sports coaches have visited Bexton to deliver CPD sessions during INSET days. Teachers were able to sign up for sessions they identified were a weakness in their teaching, and lots of practical and useful ideas were shared. As a result, teachers became more confident teaching certain areas of PE (e.g. gymnastics and dance) and using certain equipment.

KSSP fees	£1,836	There has been both a large increase in the numbers of children participating in competitions (for example – there were 5 teams entered into the hockey tournament and 4 teams in the basketball in comparison to 1 team in each last year) and a wider variety of children participating than before. Meetings are regularly held to review the KSSP initiative and local sports groups are involved in the running of the scheme. Children enjoy competing against the other schools in the area. All children are invited to the events which means we have seen an increase in children with SEN becoming involved in competitive sports. Children who participate are celebrated in school assemblies and the children who are more able or Gifted and Talented are given a chance to excel in their sport.
Staff CPD & Coaching EYFS, KS1 & KS2	11,336	Coaching staff from The PE and Sports Hub have been brought in to deliver PE lessons alongside the class teacher. This means that teachers are regularly seeing good quality PE provision being delivered and are using many of Mr Roberts' skills and approaches in their own lessons. As a result, teachers are depending less upon simple game play and electronic resources, and approaching PE with a more skills-based set up. Teacher confidence has increasingly improved. The variety of sports being covered has also improved, as the PE lead has mapped out the long-term plan for all year groups from Nursery-Year 6 in line with the relevant competitions at that time of year.
