## GOODBYE MR DOLAN

Can you remember what you were doing in August 2007? Here at Bexton we welcomed Mr Dolan as our new Head Teacher.

Since then, we have seen a whirlwind of activity as Mr Dolan's enthusiasm and commitment, supported by pupil contributions, parental support, an amazing PTA and staff hard work have seen major improvements around school.



Firstly, there came the astroturf pitch. Having identified the importance of fresh air and exercise during lunchtimes to children's concentration in the afternoons, our amazing astroturf pitch and adventure playground were installed in 2008. Since then, our pupils have been able

to play sports and ball games in all weathers (more of this later)

without the worry of drowning in a sea of mud.

The next initiative was to develop a hall area large enough to hold all children at the same time, helping to develop cohesion between infants and juniors and ensuring that all children can attend assemblies together. Five years down the line, the added benefit of the large hall is the ability for us to house about 250 parents at each school performance.

This cohesion between the separate areas in school was further enhanced through the securing of funding to build the Year 3 corridor which joined the two buildings and meant the demolition of the old and smelly Year 3 mobile, Special Needs mobile and ICT Suite (even smellier!).

Since then, we have also seen major refurbishoutdoor areas to improve children's learning enyear secured funding to refurbish the guad to a filled area for our Rainbow Room.

Changes to the building and grounds are not the only area where Mr Dolan has made a huge difference to our children's learning experiences. The introduction of ipads three years ago contributed to the love of learning in many of our pupils which is underpinned by the availability of a wide range of reading books in a school library that gets ever-larger.

The Bexton values underpin everything we do at Bexton and have led to many inspirational (and much copied by other schools) initiatives such as SUMO, Ethical Enterprise, Growth mindset and independent learning. This year, we have extended our music provision to enable Year 5 pupils to develop their orchestral musical talents in a range of instruments from the glockenspiel to brass and woodwind.

As parents, you have not escaped the Dolan effect; the introduction of wraparound care has helped working parents juggle work and family commitments and the work of FOBS has provided brilliant social events for children and parents alike. We also have a FOBS Choir – not something that

many schools can claim!


