Early Years Songs and Nursery Rhyme



During the Early Years we recognise the importance of singing songs and nursery rhymes to create a love of language and boost vocabulary. Children enjoy singing familiar songs, using actions and their bodies to move in time to music. Rhyme, rhythm and repetition helps children with their language and communication skills and supports early reading and phonics skills. At Bexton we use nursery rhymes to support children's speaking and listening and to help them build positive relationships with adults. We know that nursery rhymes expand the imagination and see children use them in play. With the younger children we use rhymes daily to help them to learn routines and give instructions. Children learn rhymes that include numbers and introduce new vocabulary related to topics.
