

Helpful Words (including Letters and Sounds tricky words)

Some common or high-frequency words which are useful for early reading and writing include letter/s-sound correspondences that are unusual or simply have not yet been taught through the phonics programme. These helpful words can be given extra attention and the unusual part pointed out.

On *Floppy's Phonics Online* you will find printable versions of helpful words, organised by Oxford Level. These include the tricky words listed in Phases Two to Five of the Department for Education's framework, *Letters and Sounds*, which are also given below.

Print off the helpful words when they are needed according to their inclusion in any *Floppy's Phonics Cumulative Texts* and the captions, sentences, poems and texts in the back of the *Floppy's Phonics Sounds Books*. They will also be useful for any incidental teaching and wider reading and writing in the curriculum. You can use the Book-by-Book plans for reference. Practise reading and writing the words separately and in sentences and they will soon become familiar. In addition, display the *Floppy's Phonics Helpful Words Poster* in your classroom for ready-reference.
